Meeting the Waziri Family: Words of Wisdom By Mahjabeen Jaffe

To someone meeting them for the first time, they may seem like any ordinary family. But, of course, this is definitely not the case. The Waziri family is unique, to say the least. All five members of the family have memorized the complete holy Qur'an and any list of their combined talents and abilities would fail to do them justice. Not only have they memorized the location, text and translation of the Quran's ayaat and many ahadith, they have also memorized the name of the book the hadith can be found in, along with the volume number and page number of the hadith. Their uncanny ability to memorize and recite in various orders has enabled them to learn, by heart, the Nahj ul-Balagha, Sahifa as-Sajjadiya, Usoul e Kaafi, seventy-two books on traditions, and many other Islamic works.

For almost a year, Toronto waited in anticipation of the Waziri family, whom the leader of the Islamic Republic of Iran, Ayatulah as-Sayyid Ali al-Husain al-Khameni' has called, "the miracle of the Quran in the present century". Their much awaited appearance at the Jaffa'ri Islamic Centre was met with a spellbound audience that watched in amazement as the members of the Waziri family demonstrated their astonishing skills. Even more incredible was the realization that all the children of the Waziri family are under 14.

My family and I had the good fortune and pleasure of spending an evening with the Waziris at an informal dinner held at the home of Miriam and Sajjad Ali. Afterwards, as my brother Mohamed and I sat down with Mr. Waziri for an interview in the Urdu language, we were impressed by Mr. Waziri's warmth, friendliness and good sense of humour. He gave us a glimpse of his life, his views and some of the key elements of the personal method he used to train his children. It was a valuable opportunity to learn more about the

personal lives of these admirable, dedicated individuals and to understand a little bit more about the making of a miracle.

Hurmat Ali Waziri holds a degree in law from Karachi University.

Born in Karachi, Mr. Waziri came from a well-to-do Pakistani family who owned the historical residence that Pakistan's Founder of the Nation, Mohamed Ali Jinnah lived in. It was on his first visit to the Holy Ka'aba that Hurmat Ali resolved to pursue his dream of having children whom he could devote to Allah (s.w.t) and the propagation of Islam. He prayed for Allah (sw.t.) to give him a pious wife who could share in his dream. It was on that same trip that he met a family from

Pakistan whose daughter he eventually married.

When their son Mohamed Sadiq was born to Hurmat Ali and Rukhsana Waziri, Hurmat Ali consulted with Agha Seestani and other ulema about his mission and *niyyah* to make his children Qur'an reciters; they advised him to leave Pakistan and to move to Qum to be truly successful.

Leaving his extended family, wealth and an attractive law career behind him, Mr. Waziri decided to go to Qum and began his studies in the Hawza ilmiyyah. When his son, Mohamed Sadiq, turned eight, Mr. Waziri took over the supervision of teaching him the memorization of the holy Qura'n.

"With the high ambitions and aspirations that we had and keeping in mind the value and importance of the Qur'an, we started working on an organized program", recalls Mr. Waziri. H explained that "when the children are 5-7 years of age, my wife supervises their

learning. I take over when the child reaches the age of 7." An English translation of the Farsi book, "Ba Khadaman-e-Qur'an" (i.e., 'with the servants of the Qur'an') covering the various aspects of the life of the Waziri

family, and methodology of memorization of the Qur'an, pictures, awards, etc. will be available shortly.

"People tell me that memorizing Qur'an is difficult or takes too long "says Mr. Waziri. "I have continually said that when you want to get a bachelor's degree or Ph.D. degree you have to spend 5 years at elementary school, 3 years at secondary school, 4 years at high school and university 4 to 7 years. On the whole that is 19 years, and during this period of time you put yourself and your family through quite a struggle in order to get this Ph.D. Well, this degree is important but in comparison with Qur'an it is nothing".

As he extols the virtues and stresses the importance of reciting Qur'an, Mr. Waziri freely quotes from various ahadith and Quranic Ayaat. "It is mentioned in the narrative and tradition that it is recommended for everyone to read 50 verses or one-fifth or one joze of Qur'an each day", he explains.

"Why don't we look at the promises of Allah (s.w.t)? It has come in different narrations that God has said, "Read Qur'an and go up (improve); it means for each verse that he memorizes he is given a higher position. Of course, anybody who wants to do this type of work, his goal should be for the satisfaction of God. This holy work should not be polluted by wordly aims, but surely wordly blessing will come after that." Mr. Waziri said that if we all analyze

ourselves, we can see how much time, money, effort and determination we invest when we truly want something in this world. He lamented the fact that when it comes to learning the holy Qur'an, some people do not prioritize well. For example, we may spend \$125 sending our child once a week to a private academy to learn math, but how much time does that student spend at madressah or with a private Qur'an tutor? How much money are people willing to spend on a devoted and skilled aalim to teach their children on a regular basis?

"A simple degree can take up to 20 years and with a superior Book like the Qur'an we should spend twice as much time studying it. But what do we do?" asks Mr. Waziri. "We don't even give it an hour a day. For 20 years if you dedicate to Qur'an you cannot imagine how much one would learn. We will have to respect it, elevate it, give it eminence in our lives. Allah (sw.t) will open the doors of mercy."

According to Mr. Waziri, it is

high time that more scholarship funds rewarding the memorization of the Qur'an exist for the youth of the community. He feels that monetary rewards can motivate a child and may stir people emotionally so that an interest in Qur'an memorization will emerge. He cites the example of Qura'n khaani in Ramadhan. "Imagine the uproar if we didn't give rewards at the end of the year? Even adults feel disappointed when they don't receive some recognition. There

is some value in giving gifts or money. We can raise funds easily if we put our minds to it. There are so many families in Toronto. If we focused on, say, 14 children and even 1,000 people gave a \$100 dollars monthly we can motivate a child to receive a \$100 continual reward for memorizing each joze until he finishes the whole Qur'an. We pay him the \$3,000 monthly as a lifetime scholarship. Each of these

14 students would teach another 14 students in 14 countries, thus creating a worldwide chain. Remember that anecdote about that hafiz e Quran who the Holy Prophet (SAW) bestowed with gold? Why? To attract people's interest and attention, we could say, in today's terms, 'media promotion'. We have to find a way to see what people attach importance to and respect. Think for example, "x" does a great unique job, a miracle. If you declare you would give him 10 billion dollars, tell me how many people will telecast this newsworthy item? Think of how much tabligh this will generate. ABC, CNN etc. all world's media will sit up to attention. 'What is the Quran?' they will ask." Including such scholarships when writing one's will can also help the cause, suggests Mr. Waziri.

The method of Qur'an memorization that the Waziris followed was based on five principles: pure attention, self confidence, assurance of God (certainty about God's help), giving importance to time and continuation. With

attention to this five principles and other details such as listening to taped cassettes 14 times, working for 14 hours a day, using the same Qur'an for memorization (for visual memory) etc. Mr. Waziri believes that anyone can achieve the results that he has had with his family. He believes that if his method (as outlined in the aforementioned book) is followed, a person, even if he tries not to memorize the Quran will know it by heart. His second claim is that once learned, it is impossible to forget the memorized Qur'an, even if one tries to forget for a hundred years.

"Allah (s.w.t) has given us brains. You can use CD Roms too, if you want, it can help as a supplementary aid to learn. But various things have to be implemented together. Guidance is needed but balance it out. I have employed my skills according to my own knowledge so I would ask that you don't implement my advice unless superiors have okayed it. I am small, my words are small. I consider myself as the missionary of God and the servant of the Qur'an. And I thank His generosity that he has given me His favour to train such children like Mohammad Sadiq, Zahra Khanum and Fatima Khanum. In the last years we have been to about 500 cities and countries. We are doing tabligh and are determined to go ahead. Until we die, we are committed to sacrifice for Allah (s.w.t), for Shariat, for Allah (sw.t.'s) message, for His Qur'an. If we keep our hopes and desires aside what is the difference? May Allah (s.w.t) accept our efforts, Ameen.
